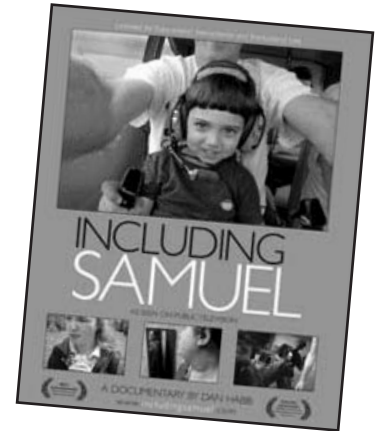
## Dan Habib

Dan Habib is the director and producer of the documentary, *Including Samuel*.

Habib is *Filmmaker in Residence* at the Institute on Disability at the University of New Hampshire. Until joining UNH in April of 2008, Mr. Habib was the photography editor of the *Concord Monitor*. In 2006 and 2008 he was named the national *Photography Editor of the Year* for papers under 100,000 circulation. Between his stints at the *Monitor*, Habib freelanced and created a multi-media documentary project titled *Teen Sexuality in a Culture of Confusion* ([www.danhabib.com](http://www.danhabib.com)). His freelance work, including extensive documentary work in China, has appeared in numerous publications, including *Time*, *Newsweek*, *Life*, *Mother Jones* and the *New York Times*.

Habib has been named *New Hampshire Photographer of the Year* six times. He has been a judge of Pulitzer Prizes, Pictures of the Year, Best of Photojournalism and White House News Photographer's Association. Habib received his first Emmy Award nomination in May 2010 for *Including Samuel* and is currently working on his second film scheduled for release in Fall 2011.

Habib and his wife, Betsy, live in Concord, New Hampshire, with their sons Isaiah, 14, and Samuel, 11.

Before his son Samuel was diagnosed with cerebral palsy, photojournalist Dan Habib rarely thought about the inclusion of people with disabilities. Now he thinks about inclusion every day. The film also features four other families with varied inclusion experiences, plus interviews with dozens of teachers, young people, parents and disability rights experts.

*Including Samuel* is a highly personal, passionately photographed film that captures the cultural and systemic barriers to inclusion.

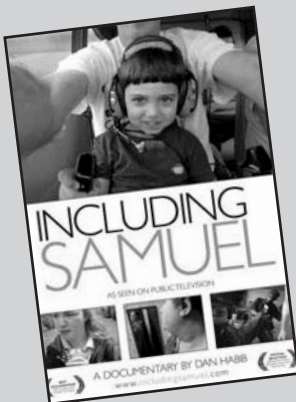

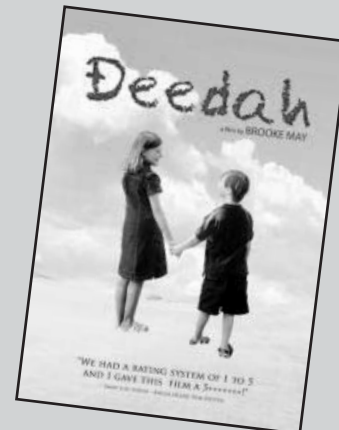
- Understand evaluations by the school and outside providers – including common tests and what all those scores mean

*Monica & David* explores the marriage of two adults with Down syndrome and the family who strives to support their needs. Monica and David are blissfully in love and want what other adults have – an independent life. Full of humor, romance and everyday family drama, the film uses intimate fly-on-the wall footage to reveal the complexity of their story. While Monica and David are capable beyond expectations, their parents, aware of mainstream rejection of adults with intellectual disabilities, have trouble letting go.

Directed by Monica’s cousin, the film has a storybook beginning with a young couple full of hope and laughter. Just before the wedding, a self-assured Monica declares: “It’s all about him, and all about me. This is my day. It’s my life, to be with my husband forever”. By their side are two fearless mothers who realize a lifelong dream – a “normal” life for their adult children.

# Siblings Workshops and Presenters

Siblings, ages 8 and up, will be included in this concurrent conference designed just for them! Siblings will be broken up into age groups of 8-12 and 13 and older. Participants must register for this program. We are pleased to have **Dr. Brian Sheridan and the Bus Stop Club** running these workshops. Children and young adults will have the opportunity to ask questions and get answers to the many things on their minds in a parent-free, comfortable environment with their peers and experts on Down syndrome. The *Bus Stop Club* is a sibling support group in the Capital District that provides psychosocial support to siblings of children with chronic illness or disability, be it physical or mental. Siblings of children with Down syndrome have much in common and certainly can benefit from this peer support and make new friends in the community! We understand that siblings are busy with sports and other weekend activities, but we can assure you that this is a program that simply should not be missed!!

## **DEEDAH AND ME**

*Deedah* is an honest, touching and often humorous account of a seven-year old girl's relationship with her six-year old brother, who has Down syndrome – or as he calls it – “Up!” syndrome. The film's title comes from the nickname the boy gave his sister at a very early age. The girl believes it was her brother's first attempt at saying “sister.”

The 26-minute film, shot in documentary news style, was produced, directed, shot and written by Brooke May, a former television news anchor and reporter who is now a stay-at-home mom to Deedah and her brother, Jonathan, in Savannah. It follows the siblings through their daily lives – at home, in school and in the community at large. Deedah tells us what it was like when her friends first met her brother. She says they were initially somewhat put off and concerned about his well-being. But now, she says, the children have embraced her brother as part of their circle of friends.

However, stereotypes abound. The girl bitterly describes her brother's experiences with bullying and says people often make inaccurate assumptions about him because of the way he looks and sounds. She says she hopes this film will open many people's eyes to the unique talents and abilities of not only her brother, but to all people with Down (Up!) syndrome. Deedah describes her brother as smart, brave and funny, with a very bright future ahead of him. The film is a good introduction to Down syndrome, as well as a reminder that sometimes our perceptions of people are far from the actual reality.

**From The North:** Take the Adirondack Northway (Interstate 87) SOUTH to Exit 4 (Route 155 West / Albany International Airport). At the end of the off-ramp, turn LEFT on Route 155. Continue for approximately 1/4 mile to the next traffic light, and turn LEFT on Albany-Shaker Road. At the next light, turn RIGHT on Wolf Road. We are about 3/10 of a mile down Wolf Road on the left side.

**From The South:** Take the New York State Thruway (Interstate 87) NORTH to Exit 24. Continue on I-87 NORTH (Exit 1N out of the toll booths) to Exit 4 (Wolf Road). Turn RIGHT off of the exit. We are about 2/10 of a mile down Wolf Road on the left.

**From The East:** Take Interstate 90 to New York, and continue on I-90 by taking Exit B-1 from the Berkshire Spur of the NYS Thruway. Follow I-90 to Exit 1N (Interstate 87). Continue on I-87 to Exit 4 (Wolf Road). Turn RIGHT off of the exit and follow Wolf Road approximately 2/10 of a mile. We are on the left side.

**From The West:** Take the New York State Thruway (Interstate 90) to Exit 24. Continue on I-87 NORTH (Exit 1N out of the toll booths) to Exit 4 (Wolf Road). Turn RIGHT off of the exit. We are about 2/10 of a mile down Wolf Road on the left.

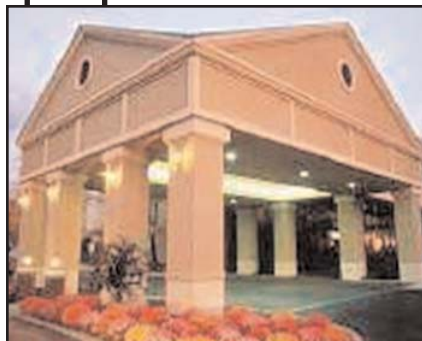

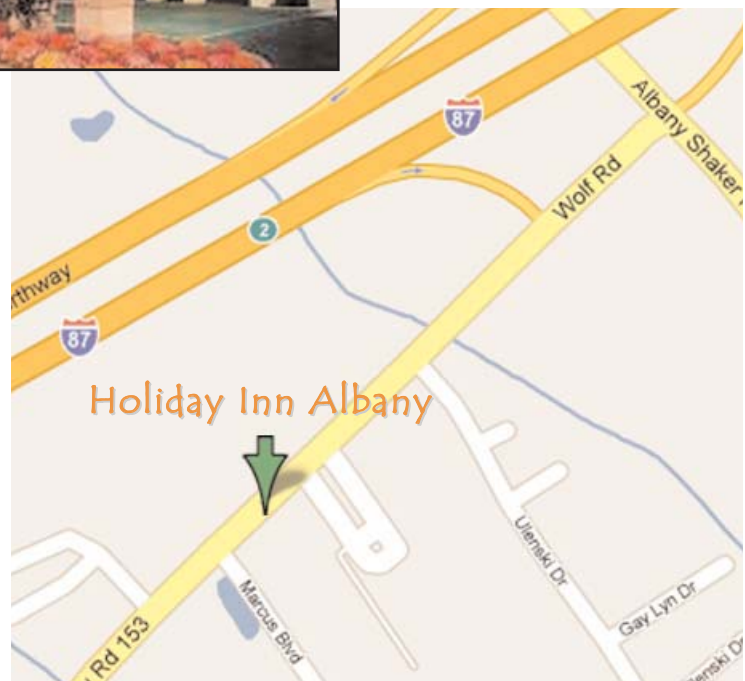
